# Wyckoff Adopts 2025 Municipal Budget – Limits Tax Increase While Advancing Infrastructure and Public Safety Investments

The Wyckoff Township Committee has formally adopted the 2025 Municipal Budget, continuing its commitment to responsible fiscal stewardship while ensuring that the needs of residents and the long-term health of the community remain top priorities. Despite economic pressures facing local governments across the state, Wyckoff's governing body has crafted a budget that delivers meaningful investments in core services, emergency preparedness, and public works—without burdening taxpayers with dramatic increases.

The budget was introduced by Finance Committee members **Peter J. Melchionne** and **Thomas J. Madigan**, who led a multi-week process of hearings and internal reviews to evaluate departmental requests, assess long-term capital needs, and mitigate rising operational costs. The adopted budget totals \$26,764,697, which includes a municipal tax levy increase of \$1,054,137—an increase that remains within both the statutory budget cap and the 2% tax levy cap established by the State of New Jersey.

For the average Wyckoff home assessed at \$810,700, this equates to a \$173.69 increase in the municipal portion of the annual tax bill. The tax rate increases by 2.1 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. These modest increases reflect the Township's focus on balancing essential service delivery and infrastructure renewal with fiscal prudence.

## **Holding the Line on Costs**

The Township continues to face the same financial headwinds affecting communities statewide, including increased costs for **solid waste disposal**, **mandated pension contributions**, **health benefits**, **liability insurance**, and **workers' compensation**. In addition, the 2025 budget responds to sharp increases in **electric**, **natural gas**, **and water costs**, driven by global energy market volatility and local infrastructure demands.

Despite these challenges, the Township Committee remains focused on maximizing every dollar through careful planning, long-term forecasting, and cost containment strategies. Routine expenses were closely reviewed to identify opportunities for savings, and grant opportunities are actively pursued to offset capital costs where possible.

#### **Service and Safety Investments**

The 2025 Budget underscores Wyckoff's ongoing commitment to **public** safety, emergency response readiness, and modernizing public infrastructure.

Key highlights include:

- New portable and mobile radios for both the Police Department and Fire Department, ensuring seamless and reliable communication between local first responders and mutual aid partners during complex incidents and joint operations.
- A **new Fire Command Vehicle** to support incident command at emergency scenes and replace a vehicle at the end of its service life.
- Replacement of essential Fire Department Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) in accordance with modern safety standards.
- Funding for architectural and engineering design of a renovated Police Department facility, recognizing that the current building is outdated and experiencing significant space constraints. The Township anticipates launching a construction project in 2026 to ensure the Department can continue meeting the community's growing public safety needs.

The budget also advances Wyckoff's long-term infrastructure priorities:

- Road resurfacing projects to maintain safe travel throughout the Township.
- Replacement of aging DPW vehicles, allowing public works crews to operate efficiently and maintain municipal assets.
- Acquisition of a new sewer vac/jet truck, which will increase the Township's ability to proactively clean and maintain sanitary and

- **storm sewer systems**, reduce flooding risk, and extend the life of underground infrastructure.
- Replacement of the 70-year-old slate roof on Town Hall, undertaken to solve long-standing water infiltration issues in the basement. After careful consideration, the Committee chose to replace the original slate roof in kind, recognizing its unmatched longevity and long-term cost-effectiveness compared to asphalt alternatives.

These investments reaffirm the Township Committee's priority of **keeping Wyckoff safe, prepared, and well-maintained**.

### **Budget Built With the Taxpayer in Mind**

Finance Committee members Peter J. Melchionne and Thomas J. Madigan held approximately eight detailed budget meetings with Township staff and department heads to develop a plan that addresses resident needs without compromising financial stability.

The 2025 Municipal Budget has been adopted in full compliance with all State-mandated fiscal guidelines, and positions Wyckoff for continued success heading into 2026 and beyond.
