Spring Leaf Collection Starts April 2

Spring leaf collection is scheduled to start Monday, April 2 in District 1. The order of districts is 1,2,3,4,5,6,7 and 8. Not sure which district you live in? Check the Street Index on our web site (wyckoff-nj.com) under Recycling & Trash or refer to the back pages of the 2018 municipal calendar.

The Township will be performing two town-wide leaf collections, beginning on Monday, April 2. The last day to rake leaves to the curb for the Spring collection is April 15. After that date, residents may bring leaves to the Recycling Center.

Bring branches to the Recycling Center at 476 West Main Street. **Branches are not collected with the leaves.**

Please note: the Department of Environmental Protection has maintained regulations to ensure compliance with the Federal Clean Water Act, which protects our drinking water as well as our streams

members are looking for a great turnout this year in their ongoing campaign promoting litter-consciousness. Volunteers from Partners in Pride will be participating in the Team Up To Tidy Up Day event. If you are unable to join us in the town wide effort to tidy up, you can help by not creating litter and also reminding those who may forget that littering is against the law. Help to control litter by placing your trash in closed containers and making sure your own property is litter free. By following these few suggestions, we can all help keep Wyckoff clean and beautiful.

Raising awareness regarding the consequences of litter also benefits our community effort to keep our lakes, streams and rivers clean. Litter often is washed into storm drains which lead to our streams and lakes and impacts our drinking water supply.

and rivers. These rules prohibit placing leaves on the paved roadway, or closer than 10 feet from any storm sewer drain.

These regulations are intended to prevent leaves and other debris from entering the storm drains. We remind residents who employ landscapers that they are responsible for instructing their landscapers about these important regulations.

Please consider composting your leaves, grass clippings and food residuals to help lower our refuse collection costs and in doing so, save tax dollars. Residents may call Town Hall at 201-891-7000 ext. 101 for information about purchasing a backyard composter. Residents may also bring their leaves and branches to the Recycling & Conservation Center located at 476 West Main Street, just off Wyckoff Avenue between Clinton Avenue and the railroad tracks.

- 11:30 a.m. the Memorial Day Parade will start at the Cornerstone Christian Church, 495 Wyckoff Avenue, and end at Town Hall.

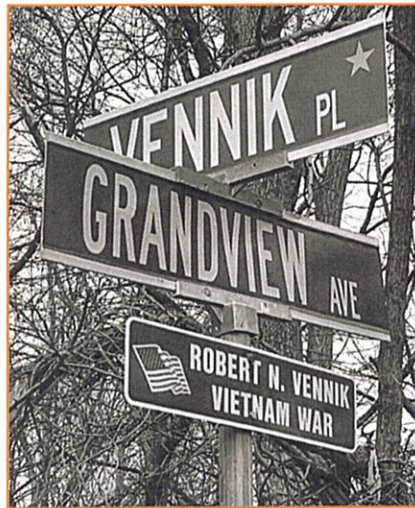
Immediately following the parade at Fire Company #1 refreshments will be served to the public.

A Reminder About The Parade Route

The Memorial Day Parade will start at 11:30 a.m. and participants will assemble at the Cornerstone Christian Church and Wyckoff Community Park. Parade spectators should be aware that the parade route is as follows: the parade will begin on Wyckoff Avenue at Cornerstone Christian Church, which is



located at 495 Wyckoff Avenue, turning left out of the parking lot on to Wyckoff Avenue (towards the Business District), then turning right on Main Street, turning right on Franklin Avenue, and ending behind Town Hall at Fire Company #1.

Street Signs With Gold Stars

To ensure that the sacrifices of Wyckoff residents who died while serving our country in time of war are forever remembered, certain streets in the township have been named after these heroes. The street signs are marked with a gold star, and below that you'll find the name of a serviceman from Wyckoff who died for our freedom and the war in which he served. These red, white and blue signs with a symbol of the American flag are intended to honor the sacrifice that these military heroes made for our country.

The Honor Roll of their names is forever remembered, inscribed on the Township's cenotaph memorial located on the green of the Wyckoff Reformed Church at 625 Wyckoff Avenue.

Vegetative Waste Pickup Begins April 12

Vegetative waste will be collected on an every other week basis on Thursdays for Districts 2,3 6, and 7; and Fridays for Districts 1, 4, 5, and 8 beginning April 12 and 13 and continuing through October 25 and 26.

Please note that the term "vegetative waste" refers to the following: small twigs and branches (no larger than three inches in diameter), garden debris, cuttings/clippings from shrubbery, plant material, and mulch. Vegetative waste does not include grass clippings, leaves, firewood, logs, rocks, building materials, or root balls. Grass clippings can

be brought to the Recycling/Conservation Center at 476 West Main Street.

Vegetative waste must be placed in open containers. Vegetative waste placed in plastic bags will not be collected. Landscaping barrels may not be used because their large size makes them difficult to handle.

Please remember that grass and/or leaves will not be collected.

The Signs All Point to Safety

With the warmer weather approaching and the increase of vehicles, pedestrians and bicyclists, we need to be a defensive driver. Obeying traffic rules and using common sense are essential. Traffic rules are in place to help protect you and others while operating a vehicle on the roadways of Wyckoff. Make sure you know the rules and that you apply them to your own driving every day.

Stay Alert - Actively pay attention to your actions and those of the drivers around you when you are driving.

Avoid Assumptions - Don't make the mistake of assuming that other drivers are going to do what you think they should do.

Use Turn Signals - While you can't depend on others always signaling their intentions when driving, you can certainly control whether or not they have realistic expectations for your actions. Always use your turn signals in advance of making a lane change or turning.

Buckle Up - Wearing your seat belt is an essential safety tip for drivers. Not only are you more likely to get injured in an accident if you aren't wearing a seat belt, you can also be fined for failing to do so.

Follow Traffic Signals - Pay close attention to and obey stop signs and traffic lights.

Respect Yellow Lights - Remember that the intent of a yellow light is to notify drivers to slow down and prepare to stop. A yellow traffic signal should not be viewed as a sign to step on the accelerator to rush through an intersection before the light turns red.

Come to a Complete Stop - When

you see a stop sign or a red light, it's important to bring your vehicle to a complete stop, even if you think no other vehicles are coming.

Do Not Text and Drive - It is against the law to send text messages when operating a motor vehicle.

Obey Speed Limits - When driving, it's important to stick to the posted speed limit at all times. The restrictions

important. After all, if you are involved in an accident you'll certainly experience more of a challenge arriving at your destination on time than if you simply exhibit patience while driving.

Be Predictable - Don't make sudden stops or lane changes. Instead, take care to ensure that other drivers are likely to be able to predict your actions to maximize safety.

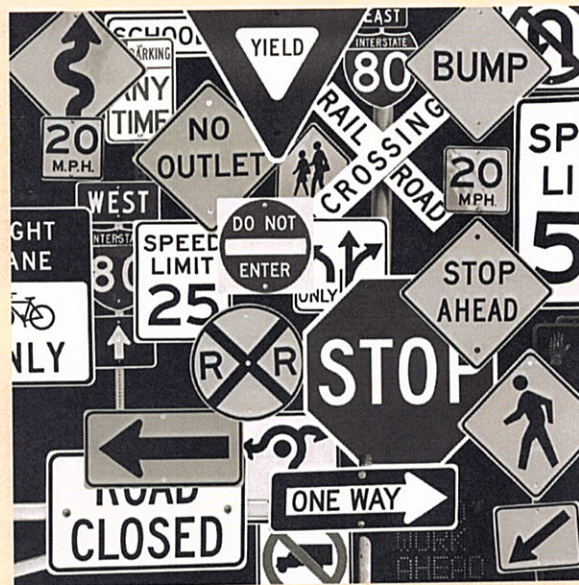
Never Drive Under the Influence - It's essential to avoid operating a vehicle if you have been drinking, taking certain types of prescription or non-prescription drugs, or are otherwise impaired.

Yield Right of Way - When other drivers have the right of way, be sure to yield to them. Also, don't make the mistake of assuming that everyone else will yield to you when they should. Regardless of who has the right to go, yield if it seems that the other driver may not be observing standard practices for yielding.

Respect Stopped Vehicles - When passing vehicles that are stopped on the side of the road, move over to get out of the way if the way is clear for you to change lanes. If changing lanes is not possible, slow down while passing stopped vehicles.

Avoid Distractions - Sending text messages isn't the only dangerous distraction that drivers need to avoid while operating a vehicle. Using cell phones, eating, and interacting with passengers are just a few examples of the types of distractions that you should take care to avoid when driving.

Do Not Drive Through Posted Roadblocks - i.e. cones, barricades, RR gates, yellow caution tape. Roadblocks are posted for your safety.



placed on vehicle speed are not established arbitrarily. Rather, they are carefully selected to maximize safety for drivers and for individuals in the homes, businesses, and other organizations in the areas where roadways are located.

Make Adjustments for Weather - When the weather is less than perfect, such as rainy, snowy, or foggy conditions, use extra precautions when driving and follow guidelines for staying safe in the particular situation you are facing.

Exercise Patience - Many accidents are caused by impatient drivers who are rushing to get from point A to point B. While time is certainly a valid consideration when traveling, safety is even more

What Not To Flush

There are many things that should never **EVER** be flushed down the toilet, such as:

The Dirty Dozen

These items should never be flushed down the toilet

When these items are flushed down the toilet they can cause problems in our homes, wastewater treatment network and the environment

Why Care?

A recent sewerage blockage at a Wyckoff home appears to have been caused by an accumulation of improperly disposed products that never should have been disposed in the toilet. Only toilet tissue paper, which is made to break down in water, is flushable. Avoid these costly mistakes, Please instruct cleaning staff to follow these guidelines.

Although the things that you may flush down the toilet may escape your home's plumbing, the sewage blockages that occur in the larger pipes affect many more people than just your family. Because the sewer services are a publicly operated service, the cost to maintain that infrastructure is collected from sewer charges, and more blockages mean a more expensive public bill.

Please inform your cleaning staff of these guidelines.

Cooperation on "Inflow" Needed

Extraneous water which is discharged into the sewer systems and is directly related to rainfall is known as inflow. Inflow greatly affects the cost of sewerage treatment for Wyckoff sewer users. Since Wyckoff pays for its metered sewerage flow, decreasing inflow can lower Wyckoff's sewer costs.

Sump pumps and floor drains are occasionally used by property owners to remove water from flooded cellars and basements by directing the water into basement sinks. Residential and business property owners who are connected to the sewer system may not know that it is illegal to discharge water from sump pumps, yards, roofs, foundations or french drains into the sanitary sewer system.

The Township Committee requests your cooperation by removing any sump pump or roof drain connected into the sanitary sewer system and instead divert the water onto your property.

Medicine Disposal Available

Residents may drop off unused or expired medicine, either prescribed or over-the-counter, at the Wyckoff Police headquarters in Town Hall at 340 Franklin Avenue. The office is open Monday through Friday, 9 am to 4:30 pm; and Saturdays between 9 am and 1 pm.

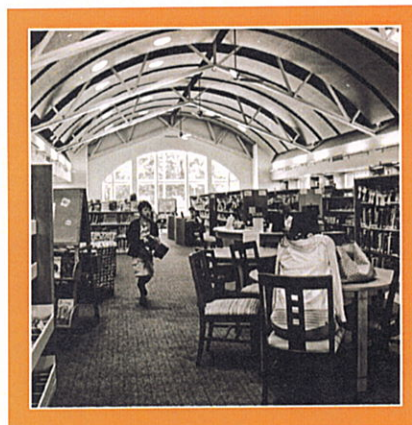

Come connect, discover and create at the library this summer by joining our Libraries Rock summer reading clubs for children, teens, and adults. There will be events and prizes for people of all ages.



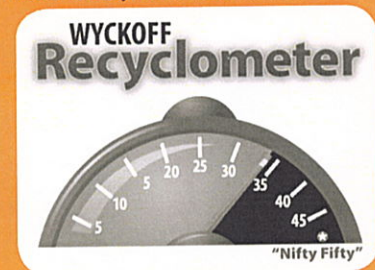
Don't Treat Recyclables Like Trash

A 50% residential recycling rate will save Wyckoff taxpayers \$85,000 - \$100,000 a year. Every extra pound recycled generates immediate savings for Wyckoff!

Our recycling rate (figures for 2017)

- 8,185.10 tons of garbage & recyclables
- 5,407.73 tons of garbage trucked to a landfill (85 miles away in Pennsylvania)
- 2,777.37 tons of recyclables collected

We recycled 33.93% of our residential trash in 2017. To reach Nifty Fifty, we need to recycle 1,315.18 more tons.



How you can help:

Disposing of Large Metal Items will make a big difference in helping us to reach Nifty Fifty. The Wyckoff DPW offers curbside collection of: washers and dryers, stoves, residential refrigerators and freezers (with doors removed), window air conditioners, dehumidifiers and large metal items. You can call 201-891-7000, ext. 101 to request a Wednesday curbside pickup. Residents may also bring these items to the Recycling Conservation Center. Do not place these items with your trash. Or, you may donate your appliances and used furniture to charity, or list them on one of the many free websites that are available. Try it, and watch how quickly they will disappear!

Keeping large items out of landfill trash will be critical to reaching Nifty Fifty, and saves \$64/ton in collection fees.

■ Wyckoff provides **weekly single stream curbside** recycling collection for convenient and easy recycling.

■ For details on how to recycle most household items, go to the Recycling Reference Table located under "Recycling & Trash" on wyckoff-nj.com.

■ Large metal appliances are collected every Wednesday; known as "White Goods Wednesday." Call 201-891-7000 ext. 101 to schedule a pick-up.

■ Bring your old electronics, computers, televisions, and phones to the Wyckoff Recycling Center at 476 West Main Street.

■ **Put a lid on your trash cans! Wet trash weighs more, so it costs more to haul away.**

■ If you are installing carpet, ask your installer to take the old carpet away with them.

■ Separate your vegetative waste from your household garbage and participate in the every other week curbside collection from April 12 & 13 and continuing through October 25 & 26. See article on page 3.

■ Donate serviceable items to charity. Consider donating suitable items to the PTO Economy Shop located on Main Street. Call 201-891-5765 for more information.

Increase recycling and decrease our garbage disposal costs



Just a reminder to residents that the 2018 Municipal Calendar, mailed to all households in December, offers a wealth of useful information about recycling and "pre-cycling." Copies are available at Town Hall.

Wyckoff Green:

Tips for Green Living at Home

- Use only reusable bottles and reusable shopping bags.
- Unplug or turn off lights when leaving a room.
- Share a ride; use public transportation; don't let your car engine idle.
- Turn up the thermostat in the summer; turn it down in the winter.
- Replace bulbs with energy-efficient LEDs/compact fluorescent light bulbs.
- Plant trees around your home strategically (on the south and west sides shading the air conditioner unit, if possible) to save on cooling and heating.
- Use native plants. They are hardier and require less maintenance.
- Teach children to turn off water while brushing their teeth. Leaving the faucet running during the recommended two minutes of brushing can waste up to 5 gallons of water.
- Consider a composter for food waste.
- "Grass-Cycle" by leaving grass clippings on your lawn. The clippings will return nutrients to the soil.
- Slow down! Driving 10 mph above 60 mph will add 50 cents to the price of a gallon of gas, since higher speed equals more gas guzzling.

Keep Pollution Out of Storm Drains



Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly into our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings – you name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water and it saves the high cost of clean-up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.

Pet Waste is Also A Source of Water Pollution

What you can do:

Pet owners or anyone who takes your pet for walks must properly dispose of the waste by picking it up, wrapping it and either placing it in the trash or flushing it unwrapped down the toilet. People with assistance animals such as Seeing Eye dogs are exempt.

community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to help protect our water.

Limit use of fertilizers & pesticides

- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it. Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because they are usually connected to local bodies of water and the water is not treated.
- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.
- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.
- Recycle used motor oil.
- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous waste disposal facilities in your area.

Keep pollution out of storm drains

- The Township is required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local bodies of water.
- Do not let sewage or other wastes

flow into a stormwater system.

- Do not dispose of pet waste into storm drains.

Don't feed wildlife

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.
- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.

Don't litter

- Place litter in trash receptacles.
- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.
- Participate in community cleanups.

Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.
- Follow the Township rules for yard waste collection.
- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.
- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.

Stormwater Mandate

The Stormwater Management Act is a government mandate to control the runoff of water from rain or snow. These mandates were initially enacted by Congress as part of the Clean Water Act and are in place nationally. Everyone relies on clean water for many of life's needs.

Polluted runoff includes many things that get into our water supply. This stems from everyday activities such as fertilizing lawns, walking pets, changing motor oil, and littering. With each rain or snowfall, pollutants generated by these activities are washed from streets and lawns into stormwater drains that flow into our waterways and the ocean.

Wyckoff is required to distribute this state-mandated information annually.

2018 Holiday Schedule for Garbage and Recycling

June, July & August – Twice a Week Garbage Collections returns

Refer to your Municipal resident calendar for the days your household garbage will be collected.

During twice a week collection, you are allowed four items per collection. Garbage and recyclables must be placed at the curb prior to 6 AM of your collection day but not before 6 PM of the night before. Empty containers must be removed by 7 PM of the collection day. Please extend common courtesy to your neighbors by removing garbage cans once they've been emptied.

Once a week recyclable collections remain throughout the year.

Holiday garbage and recycling collection schedules are outlined in the chart at the right.

Remember: there is never a limit on the number of recycling containers.

Materials accepted at the Recycling Center: Glass food or beverage containers, tin cans, aluminum cans, plastics #1 through #7 except styrofoam which is sometimes labeled #6 (all other plastics should be

discarded in the household trash), wax coated paper cartons, computer components and electronic devices, scrap metals, appliances (refrigerators and freezers with doors removed, washers, dryers, etc.), lawn mowers and snow blowers (without oil or gas), corrugated and single-ply cardboard, newsprint, books, junk mail, magazines, rechargeable batteries, cell phones, grass, leaves, branches (under 3" in diameter), brush, Christmas trees, and grass clippings.

In addition to bins at the Recycling and Conservation Center to recycle used or old clothing and shoes, bins are available outside of the Ambulance Corps building behind Town Hall and Fire Company #2 at 180 Wyckoff Avenue for your convenience. These bins generate revenue, which is used to defray taxation. Do not leave clothing or shoes outside the bins.

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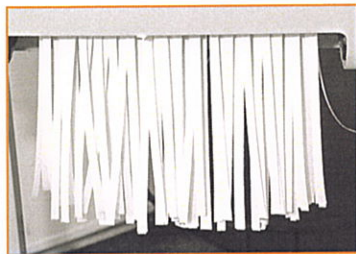
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Spring Shred Fest & Drug Drop-Off Set

The Township of Wyckoff has scheduled a mobile paper shredding vehicle available on Saturday, April 28 at the DPW yard, 475 West Main Street, from 8:30 am to 11:00 am (rain or shine) or when the truck has reached its capacity, for residents who wish to bring their confidential personal paper documents and paper correspondence for shredding at no charge. Confidential personal paper documents without metal tabs are accepted; no plastic bags and no x-rays can be shredded.



Residents will be limited to four bags or boxes weighing no more than 10 pounds each on a first come, first serve basis. Residents should bring their paper documents and correspondence in their own containers that they can take home and re-use for the next shredding event. Recyclable paper such as magazines, travel guides, and junk mail, etc. will not be accepted for shredding.

The vehicle will transport the the shredded paper to the recycling market where it will enter the recycling stream. A video display allows residents to witness the shredding of their personal documents.

Additionally, a drug drop box will be available for residents to deposit their unused and expired medications for secure disposal by the Police Department. Please remove all identifying labels from containers. No syringes will be accepted.

2018 Election Reminders

New Jersey's Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, June 5 and the polls will be open from 6:00 am to 8:00 pm. Republican and Democratic Party members may vote in the Primary for their party's candidates. Registered voters who are unaffiliated can declare themselves as a Republican or Democrat when voting on Primary Election day.

Voter Registration: The last day to register to vote in the 2018 Primary Election is Tuesday, May 15. The Municipal Clerk's office will be open from 9:00 am to 9:00 pm on May 15 to assist with voter registration.

Political Party Affiliation: Wednesday, April 15 is the deadline to change parties in order to be eligible to vote that party line in the June 7 Primary.

Vote By Mail: Vote by Mail is an application and ballot process for registered voters. The County Clerk must receive applications no later than seven days prior to the Election Day and ballots must be returned to the County Board of Elections before the polls close on Election Day.

Voter Registration applications, Political Party Affiliation forms, and Vote by Mail applications can be obtained from the Municipal Clerk's office or can be downloaded from www.njelections.org.

Please note that the General Election will be held on Tuesday, November 6.
