"I've lived here in Wyckoff for just five years, so I'm new here after living in Ridgewood for over 30 years. I just wanted to let you know that there was a wonderful, you know, opportunity for the Spring Meadow people to donate to the Ukrainian people. The Library Board of Trustees is thoroughly reviewing their meeting room usage policies. And, the Library has received a gift from the Franco Family of Holocaust books. A dedication ceremony is scheduled for Tuesday, May 31, 2022, at 7:00 p.m. More information to follow.
- 3. The Wyckoff Board of Health conducted a very short meeting whereby President Steve Clarke completed the "tasks" in just fifteen (15) minutes.
- 4. Mayor Boonstra advised there has been significant discussion about the location of the restrooms for the new athletic facility at the Memorial Campus specifically, a free-standing restroom facility. The Facilities Committee and Committeeman Shanley, Liaison for the Recreation Advisory Board will further discuss the preliminary designs, size, height and location of the imminent facility. Committeeman Madigan commented that as a former member of the now dissolved Parks & Recreation Advisory Board, the \$40,000 donation for the new gazebo/pavilion near the snack stand and library needs to be finalized. Mr. Madigan was only familiar with the snack stand with incorporated bathrooms. A lengthy discussion ensued, and the Township Committee determined considerable additional information is necessary to move forward on this matter. Committeeman Shanley asked who would be preparing the site plan for the snack stand project at the Memorial Campus. Mayor Boonstra advised that the last site plan was prepared by Steve Eid's company. During this discussion, Committeewoman Rubenstein arrived at the Work Session Discussion.

- 2. The Maple Lake closing has been a "Team Effort" since 2015. Mr. Landel thanked every past committee person and the residents who continue to vote in favor of the Open Space Trust Fund. The Township of Wyckoff has significantly benefitted from this funding which has provided monies for park improvements.

### Continuation of Mayor Boonstra's Report:

- 5. Mayor Boonstra thanked Diana Mcleod, Chief Financial Officer, for attending this evening's meeting to introduce the 2022 Municipal Budget.
- 6. Mayor Boonstra also attended the Wyckoff Volunteer Fire Department Annual Fire Inspections on Friday, March 18, 2022. Congratulations to Fire Company #1 for winning the competition.
- 7. Mayor Boonstra, Committeeman Madigan and the Administrator attended the Eastern Christian Children's Retreat Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month Breakfast at the Brownstone Restaurant. The mayors from Midland Park, Waldwick and Oakland were also in attendance. Elected officials from Wayne and Midland Park were in attendance as well. Councilwoman Pete from Midland Park congratulated Mayor Boonstra on the Maple Lake acquisition because it will affect the Midland Park residents in the Wortendyke area.
- 8. Mayor Boonstra provided a brief summary relating to the Maple Lake acquisition.
  - "As Rob Landel indicated, this acquisition began back in 2015 with the first contact from the property owners. Then we negotiated and it didn't go anywhere. It went cold for a long period. Then the property owners hired a new attorney and things began to move again. There were many meetings and a lot of work by Rob Landel. We can't thank you enough for this. At Rob's office last week, we had the final documents signed for the closing. Now the property belongs to the Township of Wyckoff and what our intention is, we're going to get a couple of companies in there to see what we can do to clean up debris that's in there. There are some old foundations and some other things that are in there. We need to do some clean up while we have full access to the property before any development starts. The property is located on the 90-degree bend on the lower end of Cedar Hill Avenue. It's accessed through the streets that we renamed McNamara Lane and we'll have a limited amount of parking there with a small access way and it'll basically just be a very passive, natural space like a bird sanctuary or an arboretum. With this acquisition, we'll extend our wetlands buffer from right behind the carwash next door to Town Hall, all the way along the railroad tracks down to Newtown Road."
- 9. Mayor Boonstra spoke to Councilwoman Pete from Midland Park about Ridgewood Water and the lead pipe replacement. Committeeman Shanley has agreed to be a representative for the group that Midland Park and Glen Rock are establishing to communicate with Ridgewood Water.

 Mayor Boonstra extended a very Happy 15<sup>th</sup> Wedding Anniversary to Tim & Melissa Shanley.

#### Melissa Rubenstein:

- 1. Ms. Rubenstein attended a meeting of the Zabriskie House Trustees. # #22-154 <u>Authorize Installment Payment Plans for Delinquent Sewer</u> <u>Users</u>

**WHEREAS,** P.L.2021 c.317 instituted immediate relief measures for residential customers of local government sewer service whereby their service may be discontinued; and,

WHEREAS, the legislation requires that an installment plan shall be offered to satisfy the unpaid balance of any sewer charges accrued between March 9, 2020, and March 15, 2022; and,

WHEREAS, the mandatory installment plan for arrearages accruing between March 9, 2020 and March 15, 2022 shall have a minimum 12-month duration, unless the residential customer requests a shorter payback period, and cannot require the residential customer to pay a down payment, deposit, reconnection costs, or the payment of interest or penalties on the unpaid balance.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Township Committee of the Township of Wyckoff, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey hereby authorizes the Tax Collector to offer and enter into installment plans for delinquent residential sewer customers with arrearages accruing between March 9, 2020, and March 15, 2022, for a maximum period of 12 months. Payments will be due on the first of each month beginning May 1, 2022. If any unpaid installment remains unpaid after 30 days of due date or any other property taxes or municipal charges become delinquent during the term of the installment plan, then the agreement shall be made null and void and payable immediately. The installment plan shall not require the payment of interest or penalties on the unpaid balance.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that interest accruing on any unpaid sewer charges shall be waived for residential sewer customers that agree to enter into an installment plan as authorized by this Resolution for arrearages accruing between March 9, 2020, and May 1, 2022.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that if a residential customer does not agree to an installment plan by May 1, 2022, then interest shall accrue effective March 15, 2022, pursuant to law and Resolution # 22-18 and appropriate enforcement action shall be taken by the Tax Collector.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Tax Collector shall provide a written a summary of all installment plans offered and agreed upon to the Township Committee at the first regular Township Committee Meeting in May.

## **ORDINANCE #1958**

# AN ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATION LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK.

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S. 40A:4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget up to

2.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

WHEREAS, the Township Committee of the Township of Wyckoff in the County of Bergen find it advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2022 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the Township Committee hereby determines that a 1% increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$151,312.60 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and,

WHEREAS, the Township Committee hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Township Committee of the Township of Wyckoff in the County of Bergen authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring that, in the CY 2022 budget year, the final appropriations of the Township of Wyckoff shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S. A. 40A:4-45, be increased by 1%, amounting to \$151,312.60 and that the CY 2022 municipal budget for the Township of Wyckoff be approved and adopted in accordance with the ordinance; and,

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED,** that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED**, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED,** that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Direction within 5 days after such adoption.

### Resolution not included with Consent Agenda

Committeewoman Rubenstein stated: So, this is my fifth year of being able to serve on our Finance Committee and for several years, Tom Madigan and I cochaired the committee together. It's one of my favorite things to do as a committee person. As you know we take great pride in our budget in our tax rate in our dedication to the taxpayers. With Diana McLeod's help and recently Matt Cavallo's help, we've crafted what we believe is a budget that's really in the best interest of the taxpayers. We have limited the increase to less than three tenths of one percent the average home the impact will be tax increase of \$17.98 for 2022. That is two tenths of a cent per \$100 of assessed value. Within that budget, we've stuck to the principles that we have believed in over the past few years. The first being infrastructure, and we are dedicated to make the roads in our town as safe and as drivable as possible. Drive around other towns in Bergen County you will hit a lot of potholes on the roads. Our town can improve road that are not county roads. We strive to improve the roads so that is a big focus of our budget, safety, and service. Also, a main focus of our budget, we've increased the number of solar powered flashing lights, flashing signals at crosswalks around our elementary schools at Franklin Avenue and Crescent Avenue, Wyckoff Avenue and Monroe Avenue, Grandview Avenue and Ravine Avenue with calming traffic signs. We've tried to hold the line on spending. Every year our department heads come to us with their needs for their departments. We spent several meetings and a lot of hours parsing through what our department heads need. Hopefully we've satisfied a lot of their requests, but always keeping the taxpayer in mind and what I would like to always remind taxpayers is that the municipal budget is only 14% of your total property taxes. So that's the portion that we have control over. That portion is what we're talking about tonight. And we will put out our PSA so that everybody can really see and understand with an actual pie chart which I love pie charts and bar graphs that 46% of your taxes go to the local schools, 24% go to the regional schools, 14% go to county taxes and open space. 2% is the mandatory library tax 14% is in municipal tax and open space. I think something that's really important this year to know as Rob was saying with Maple Lake, your open space taxes that minimal amount that every resident pays every year allowed us to preserve 21 acres of land. That was a huge accomplishment for our town. Now going forward without those huge acquisitions. Our focus on open space can be maintaining our parks, our gardens and our fields are open spaces to make them accessible and enjoyable by all our residents. So, I'm incredibly proud of this budget and look forward to any questions both from the public and from the rest of the committee members.

Committeeman Madigan also thanked Committeewoman Rubenstein and also enjoyed the last five years working with Committeewoman Rubenstein. We enjoy the budget process, but it does get arduous and challenging. Special thanks to Diana McLeod who really hangs in there. Ms. McLeod helps us through and makes a lot of wise decisions each and every day. We are very proud of this year's budget. We're particularly mindful of the inflation pressures on our residents. This 2022 budget begins our process of providing our police officers

radio and software upgrades which will improve public safety and communications. We did our best to hold the line and cost. We held flat the standard operating expenses compared to last few years. And again, thanks to the department managers who worked very hard to minimize expenditures and assisted all of us to hold down operating expenses. We were extremely mindful of safety within the town. As we went through the various expenses request. Glad to say that Police, Fire and Public Works; we were able to fund a lot of most pressing needs. So, it was a good experience. As Melissa said, we try to do our best to minimize tax impact on our residents. Municipal taxes are only 14% of your total tax bill. County taxes are 14%, local schools, K to 8 tax levy is 46% and the Regional High School is 24%. I'm confident that they are also mindful of the added inflationary pressures that our residents have. Thank you.

Mayor Boonstra addressed the audience and Township Committee, asking if there were any further comments or questions.

Committeeman Shanley raised a question and said that having Diana, our CFO here at the meeting may provide an easy answer. One of the pressing needs that I see in the next few years is the purchase of a Tower Ladder Truck for the Fire Department. I've known that since I've been on the Committee back in 2017 that we're on borrowed time with our Tower Ladder getting older. Is there anything we can do to plan for, in this budget, or does that all have to be in the future when purchasing because inflationary pressure is hitting us now and trying to buy anything right now is tough, and it might be even harder as we go down the road.

Committeeman Madigan said that he can perhaps answer part of the question Committeeman Shanley asked. January 4, 2022, we gave the Fire Department the go ahead to form a committee to look into the ladder truck. Thinking of the future the goal is to take delivery of a ladder truck in 2025. We did several things, Diana can comment a little bit as you asked her, but they are forming a committee. The committee is not finalized yet but there will be members from Company #1, #2 and #3 on the committee. So, the goal is to be able to maneuver and plan for delivery of the fire truck in 2025.

Diana McLeod stated I believe over time with the Finance Committee it was decided that rather than put money away as we used to in sinking funds, which is basically taxing or increasing taxes and holding the money for future use, that it would be better on a large ticket item like that to have debt and go out to bond because we would bond anyway and then the year prior when we know we're going to award the bid for it after the bid specs and the quotes are taken in. We would just need a down payment in that year's budget. And then we would debt the rest. I think it's more fiscally prudent on a large ticket item like that than trying to put money away because we have competing needs every budgetary year.

Committeewoman Rubenstein commented some of us have been talking about the Fire Truck Committee needs input by this governing body since we're financing it and purchasing it. So, I would definitely be willing to get the recommendations from the Fire Department and then we you know, if everybody's amenable to it, the committee really should be represented with input by our governing body.

Committeeman Madigan commented we really haven't set the budget, right? We still must set from the Township. We asked them to start putting the committee together. They were kind of anxious to do it. We just have a lot of other things going on. But we gave them the goal of forming a committee in January.

Committeewoman Rubenstein commented if they could give us their list of specifications, then we can kind of supplement it with two of our members and Diana because there are some townhall staff are going to have to be involved with that.

Committeeman Madigan commented that since it's going to be a substantial purchase, it makes sense to have Diana and Townhall to be involved in the specifications and financing as part of the committee.

Mayor Boonstra inquired, so are you proposing to do that for the first pumper or two, or are you suggesting that this is kind of a routine thing going forward?

Committeewoman Rubenstein replied to Mayor Boonstra, no we were just talking about the tower ladder truck.

Committeeman Madigan stated he will report back when they put specifications for the Tower Ladder Truck together.

Committeewoman Rubenstein feels by the fourth quarter of 2022 we should probably have the specifications and committee in place.

Committeeman Madigan stated it will take at least a year to put the specifications together.

Mayor Boonstra commented, getting back to the budget, I think the annual increase is very appropriate in the in the inflationary times we're looking at going forward and I commend the committee for doing that. And as Tom indicated, I only hope other entities who utilize Wyckoff taxpayer monies would look at their budgets with the same efforts. I so appreciate what our Finance Committee has done. And I said, everyone should use the same philosophy as our Finance Committee when they're putting a budget together.

# Wyckoff Municipal Budget Adopted Limiting Increase to Less Than 3/10 of 1 Percent

The Wyckoff Township Committee introduced the 2022 municipal budget on March 22, 2022. The Township Committee, led by Finance Committeepersons Melissa D. Rubenstein and Thomas J.

Madigan, worked diligently to limit the growth of the budget and provide a stable tax rate despite requirements to address uncontrollable expenses such as state mandated pension costs and employee health care costs. The impact on the average home (assessed at \$801,100) is \$17.98 for 2022. The tax rate increases 2/10<sup>th</sup> of 1 cent per \$100 of assessed valuation. The 2022 budget totals \$21,229,875 with a tax levy increase of \$104,174. The municipal budget is within the budget cap and the 2% allowable tax levy cap.

The Municipal Budget accounts for only 14% of a resident's tax bill. The schools and county elected officials establish their own budgets and their own tax levies.

### Service and Safety Investments

In 2022, the budget reflects a decision to invest in the Township's infrastructure. It includes funds allocated for road resurfacing and replacing DPW rolling stock which has reached the end of its useful life. To comply with State and Federal mandates, firefighter safety equipment such as personal protective gear and self-contained breathing apparatus for search and rescue are funded. Additional pedestrian safety improvements and traffic calming devices will be deployed in 2022 for enhanced pedestrian safety. They include solar powered flashing signals at the following crosswalks located near our elementary schools: 1) Franklin Avenue & Crescent Avenue 2) Wyckoff Avenue & Monroe Avenue 3) Grandview Avenue & Ravine Avenue. Traffic calming signs which display, "Please Slow Down", when a vehicle exceeds the speed limit and/or, "Thank you for Driving at or Below the Speed Limit" message signs will be installed at five (5) additional locations identified by Chief David V. Murphy.

In addition, the 2022 budget begins the process of providing police officer radio and software upgrades which will improve public safety in the event of an active shooter, crime scene, or motor vehicle accident.

### **Holding the Line on Costs**

The Finance Committee held flat the standard operating expenses, as compared to last year's levels, to compensate for service and safety investments. The Township Committee appreciates the efforts of our Department Managers who worked with us in reviewing every line item of the budget to justify their need for taxpayer money to provide services to our community. Our Department Managers worked hard to minimize expenditures and assisted the Township Committee to hold down operating expenses.

Once again, the Finance Committee reviewed every line item of the budget to justify each proposed line item of expense to help control the growth of expenditures. No changes to the current Township provided services are planned.

### **Maintaining Priorities**

The Township Committee continues its efforts to control the increase in expenditures, pursuing positive fiscal operation such as seeking grants from all levels of government and reducing operating costs through competitive bidding and shared services. Cost reductions and enhanced technology have been realized by regionalization with the Township's many Shared Service Agreements, which include: 9-1-1 dispatch services, Board of Health services with the Bergen County Health Department, fuel facilities and vehicle maintenance services to the Wyckoff Board of Education, strategic purchasing through Northwest Bergen Cooperative Purchasing Consortium and the Wyckoff, Oakland, Franklin Lakes (WOLF Group) shared services group. Our cost saving, successful shared service for Court Administrator and Violations Bureau Services with Glen Rock, has also been renewed for an additional two-year term.


# THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE ONLY ESTABLISHES THE MUNICIPAL PORTION OF TAXES

Diana McLeod, the Township's Chief Financial Officer and Tax Collector, also points out that municipal taxes represent only a portion (14%) of a Wyckoff property taxpayer's obligation. Three separate governmental entities adopt their own budgets which are then funded by taxes. They are the Bergen County government, the K-8<sup>th</sup> Local Public School District and the Ramapo-Indian Hills Regional High School District. Two tax levies, the Bergen County Open Space Tax and the Municipal Open Space Tax are approved by voter referendum. The Wyckoff Free Public Library Tax is a separate tax levy; however, it is included in the municipal budget total and represents 8% of the municipal budget. The county taxes, K-8<sup>th</sup> local grade school taxes and regional high school taxes have not yet been determined. Although a resident's tax bill reflects all seven separate taxes, the Township Committee is involved in the municipal budget and tax levy portion ONLY and has no involvement in determining the other budgets nor the determination of the six other tax levies. State fiscal laws require the Township's municipal government to serve as the billing and collection agency for all six separate taxes including the Wyckoff Free Public Library tax. Ms. McLeod states that the sum of all seven of these tax rates ultimately determines the total property tax rate for the year.

# <u>Additional Parameters That Guided Finance Committee Members, Melissa D. Rubenstein and Thomas J. Madigan</u>

- The 2022 budget was developed with the taxpayer in mind.
- We worked diligently through approximately 8 meetings to deliver this budget with a focus on delivering residential services at a marginal tax increase of \$17.98 on an average residential assessment of \$801,100.
- Technology investments, including investing in Cyber Security have been made where we can demonstrate efficiency and/or economic gains.
- The budget is being introduced within the State mandate deadline.
